Great oaks from little acorns grow, it is said. Growth in this case is not instant, of course. Oak trees take about 75 years to reach their full height. The ancient woodlands of Epping Forest have many magnificent oaks. They have grown and developed over hundreds of years. Walking in these areas is a reminder of the value of slow but steady growth.

In recent times our usually hectic world has slowed down. Concerns over the spread of Covid-19 have led to the closure of schools, businesses, and churches. Life has changed beyond recognition for many of us. The gradual reopening of society has only just begun. At last there is at least some hope of 'getting back to normal'. Or is it just possible that the enforced slowdown could be the catalyst for change, transformation, new growth, new opportunities, new understanding?

Once the ministry of Jesus was underway, twelve people were chosen to help grow the work. With crowds gathering daily to hear him teach more workers were needed. Each of the men selected had been with Jesus since the beginning of his public ministry. They had learned from him and seen remarkable things happen. Jesus instructed them to start small. They were given the power to heal and to release the mentally distressed from oppression. No preaching was required, just a willingness to play a part in sharing the good news as they were able.

There was no time to waste. The travellers need not take supplies as hospitality would be offered along the way. Time should only be spent where they found themselves welcome. These twelve Jewish men were, for the time being at least, to remain among their own people. Time and space were needed for the work to grow. Great things would result from these small beginnings.

Slowly, gradually, possibilities are emerging for Christians to begin reaching out and sharing the good news. We have much to offer our own communities in the coming days. Preaching is not our first priority. The call is to bring healing of body and mind to those who have suffered either physically or mentally in recent months. It is Jesus himself who empowers and sends us. All we need will be provided on the way.

Great things may yet grow from these small beginnings. The twelve apostles were amazed at what happened when they stepped out on the road. As we do the same may God empower, inspire, and encourage us to play our part in the growth of the kingdom of heaven.
