Thought for the week



Gardens across the UK are blooming this year. Good weather in the Spring coincided with the introduction of the 'stay at home' instruction imposed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Those fortunate enough to have gardens of their own rediscovered the beauty of the natural world on their back doorstep. Many took up tools, bought seeds and began nurturing plants. As a result, in many places, Britain really is in bloom this summer.

The garden at Highams Park Baptist Church has also needed some attention this year. Drainage work had disturbed large areas of the lawn. When the holes were filled in the drainage company sowed seed that failed to take due to lack of water and poor preparation of the ground. Two months later the picture is much brighter thanks to the work of our church gardener. Careful preparation of the soil to remove stones before reseeding and regular watering during the sunniest month on record were needed. The area is now restored and the grass growing well.

In the coming weeks churches in Britain will begin to reopen. New guidance has been issued to ensure this is done safely in these early post-pandemic times. The restrictions in place will shape collective worship and prayer for some time in ways that many feel will be uncomfortable. Rather like the rocky ground Jesus describes in the parable of the sower this new territory seems unpromising. The challenge to Christians in this new situation will be to find ways of nurturing new life in these difficult conditions.

Changing the old familiar ways is never easy. Norman the missionary knew that a new strain of rice could help his community in Guinea Bissau. It took some time for the villagers to trust him enough to begin planting the new seed. They were suspicious of the unfamiliar and afraid of the consequences of change. In the end the results were transformative. In the same way, Christians in Britain today face a choice. Church services will look and feel different for the foreseeable future. Learning to worship in this new situation may be difficult but there is the possibility that the results could be transformative. Together we must find the strength to overcome our suspicion of the unfamiliar and trust God to help us embrace change.

Careful preparations are underway to give the seeds that will be planted the best chance of growth. Although success depends upon the action of the Divine Gardener, the decision to plant is ours to take. We move forward in faith, trusting the God we worship to water the seeds that are planted and to bring them to growth when the time is right.
